The reality is, breeding revolves around randomness and chance and if we understand and use genetic principles, we have a set of breeding rules to follow. Not following these rules increases the chance of producing inferior dogs who are more prone to health problems; we also waste time and resources. Observing the rules of genetics provides a short cut to breeding better, healthier dogs. Longterm breeding success requires an understanding of why something happens in a breeding program. This is the stuff of genetics and is key to keeping the good things and eliminating undesirable traits in the dogs we breed. Just as our ability to read and write requires learning our ABCs, learning to breed purebred dogs begins with a layman's understanding of how a sire and dam pass traits on to offspring.
