BILATERAL SYMMETRY IS A CHARACTERISTIC OF MANY LIVING ORGANISMS, INCLUDING HUMANS. THIS SYMMETRY ALLOWS FOR BALANCED FUNCTION AND STRUCTURE, CONTRIBUTING TO THE OVERALL HOMEOSTASIS AND FUNCTIONALITY OF THE BODY.
