Introductory Rites

The Penitential Act is a prayer of confession where the faithful acknowledge their sins and seek God's mercy. This act of humility prepares the hearts of the congregation for the sacred mysteries. Forms of the Penitential Act include the Confiteor or the Kyrie Eleison.

Gloria

The Gloria is a hymn of praise to God, traditionally sung or recited on Sundays outside of Advent and Lent, as well as on solemnities and feasts. It expresses joy and adoration, glorifying the Holy Trinity.

Collect or Opening Prayer

The Introductory Rites conclude with the Collect, a prayer that "collects" the intentions of the congregation and sets the theme for the Mass. The priest offers this prayer on behalf of all present.

Liturgy of the Word

The Liturgy of the Word is a central part of the Catholic Mass parts, focusing on the sacred Scriptures. Through readings and homilies, the faithful hear God's message, which nourishes their faith and guides their Christian living.

First Reading

The first reading is usually taken from the Old Testament, except during the Easter season when it is drawn from the Acts of the Apostles. This reading reveals God's covenantal relationship with His people and sets the foundation for the Gospel message.

Responsorial Psalm

After the first reading, a Responsorial Psalm is sung or recited by the assembly. This psalm reflects on the Word just proclaimed and invites the congregation to respond with prayer and praise.

The second reading typically comes from the New Testament letters or the Book of Revelation. It provides instruction, encouragement, and theological reflection relevant to Christian life and faith.

Gospel Acclamation

Prior to the Gospel reading, the assembly sings the Gospel Acclamation, often the Alleluia, to honor the words of Christ. During Lent, a different acclamation replaces the Alleluia to reflect the penitential nature of the season.

Gospel Reading

The Gospel is the high point of the Liturgy of the Word. The priest or deacon proclaims one of the four Gospels, narrating the life, teachings, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. The congregation stands as a sign of reverence.

Homily

Following the Gospel, the priest or deacon delivers the homily, a reflection that explains the readings and applies their lessons to the lives of the faithful. The homily helps the congregation understand the Word of God in their daily contexts.

Profession of Faith

On Sundays and solemnities, the Nicene Creed is recited by all, professing the core beliefs of the Catholic faith. This profession unites the assembly in a shared declaration of faith.

Prayers of the Faithful

The Liturgy of the Word concludes with the Prayers of the Faithful, also known as the Universal Prayer. The congregation petitions God for the Church, the world, the local community, and those in need.

Liturgy of the Eucharist

The Liturgy of the Eucharist is the heart of the Catholic Mass parts, where the sacrament of the Eucharist is celebrated. It encompasses the preparation, consecration, and distribution of Holy Communion, recalling Christ's

sacrifice and real presence.

Preparation of the Gifts

The altar is prepared during the Presentation of the Gifts, where bread and wine are brought forward by the faithful. The priest prays over the gifts, asking God to accept them as a spiritual sacrifice.

Prayer over the Offerings

The priest offers a prayer asking that the gifts of bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ and that the offering is pleasing to God.

Eucharistic Prayer

The Eucharistic Prayer is the central prayer of the Mass, consisting of several parts: the Preface, the Sanctus (Holy, Holy, Holy), the Epiclesis (invocation of the Holy Spirit), the Institution Narrative (the words of Jesus at the Last Supper), the Anamnesis (remembrance of Christ's Passion and Resurrection), the Offering, the Intercessions, and the Doxology.

The Lord's Prayer

After the Eucharistic Prayer, the congregation recites the Lord's Prayer together, uniting in the prayer Jesus taught to His disciples.

Sign of Peace

The Sign of Peace follows, where members of the congregation offer each other a gesture of peace and reconciliation, symbolizing unity before receiving Communion.

Fraction Rite and Communion

The priest breaks the consecrated host during the Fraction Rite, symbolizing Christ's body broken for the faithful. Communion is then distributed to the congregation, who receive the Body and Blood of Christ.

Prayer after Communion

The Liturgy of the Eucharist concludes with a prayer of thanksgiving, asking that the graces received through Communion strengthen the faithful in their

lives.

Concluding Rites

The Concluding Rites bring the Catholic Mass parts to a close. They include final prayers and the dismissal, sending the faithful forth to live out the Gospel in their daily lives.

Announcements

If necessary, announcements or instructions for the parish community are given by the priest or a designated minister.

Blessing

The priest blesses the congregation, invoking God's grace and protection over the people as they leave the church.

Dismissal

The Mass ends with the dismissal, where the deacon or priest sends the assembly forth, often with the words, "Go forth, the Mass is ended," or "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord." This dismissal emphasizes the mission of the faithful to live according to the Gospel.

Recessional

The ministers process out of the church, often accompanied by a recessional hymn, marking the formal conclusion of the liturgical celebration.

There, by setting the Latin Mass in an Irish home, Joyce casts doubt upon the Church's ability to transform matter, and, in his revised version of the story, he casts further doubt by including parallels with the Greek liturgy, a rite he regarded as subversive of the Latin Mass. Next, Lang reinterprets Joyce's theory of literary art in light of its specific origins in Aquinas and the New Testament, and in doing so he reveals the precise meaning of the term epiphany. He proceeds to demonstrate that the earlier theory, including the concept of epiphany, underlies the Hamlet theory, and that the famous reference to love is linked to God's narcissism and creativity. How the literary artist resembles God is implied not only in the Hamlet theory but in the references to orthodox and heretical views of the Father-Son relation and the Eucharist, views that explain Joyce's reincarnation as both Stephen Dedalus and Leopold Bloom. In *Ulysses* the word reincarnation has an additional meaning. Not only does Joyce's soul assume new flesh, but so does the Word of God. Along with the feast of Christ celebrated in Ireland on 16 June 1904, the novel assimilates first the Mass, then the black mass, and finally the Good Friday liturgy. At the end of *Ulysses*, Molly Bloom emerges as the genuine christine prophesied on the first page. Joyce's offering of her body, blood, and water evokes both the Crucifixion and the Eucharist, and thus makes flesh a Gospel read in Irish churches on the day he chose as Bloomsday.
