It is argued that the mourning "I"'s intimate bodily empathizing (theorized as symphysizing) with her deceased, queerfeminine beloved life partner facilitates the processes of vitalist-material and spiritual-material co-becoming, and the rethinking of death from a new and different perspective than that of the sovereign, philosophical subject.
