The highly acclaimed novel was published in 2007 and won, among others, the Pulitzer Prize for Fiction 2008. It tells the story of Oscar, a Dominican-American boy, who grows up in the immigrant neighborhood of Paterson, New Jersey, influenced by U.S. society, the diaspora, and Dominican culture. The main conflict of the novel takes place between Oscar and the world.
