BEFORE DISPOSING OF WORKBOOKS, IT IS CRUCIAL TO UNDERSTAND THESE MATERIALS AND THEIR POTENTIAL IMPACT ON THE RECYCLING PROCESS.

#### RECYCLING PROCESSES FOR WORKBOOKS
